1. (a) Provide the correct answer for each of the following situations.
 - (i) At the airport, you meet a stranger whom you want to ask something. What language would you use?
 - (ii) What level of style is when the language used is set and not open to modification, as it is in the National anthem of Tanzania?
 - (iii) Students wrote a report in an impersonal style. They used passive voice at large. What province would that be?
 - (iv) Masumbuko is editing his work, considering the arrangement of paragraphs, bolding and italicising some phrases. What marker of style is he considering?
 - (v) The language styles Kilombo uses when talking to her teachers and classmates are different. What does Kilombo consider in this choice of language styles?
- (b) Advertising uses language in a specific way to persuade audiences. Outline five linguistic features commonly used in commercial advertisements.
2. “How is prose a unique genre?” Explain by providing five (5) points.
3. Read the following poem carefully and then answer the questions which follow:

 - (e) How does the verse, “**Oh I am lonely so lonely here**”, reflect the broader context of alienation?
