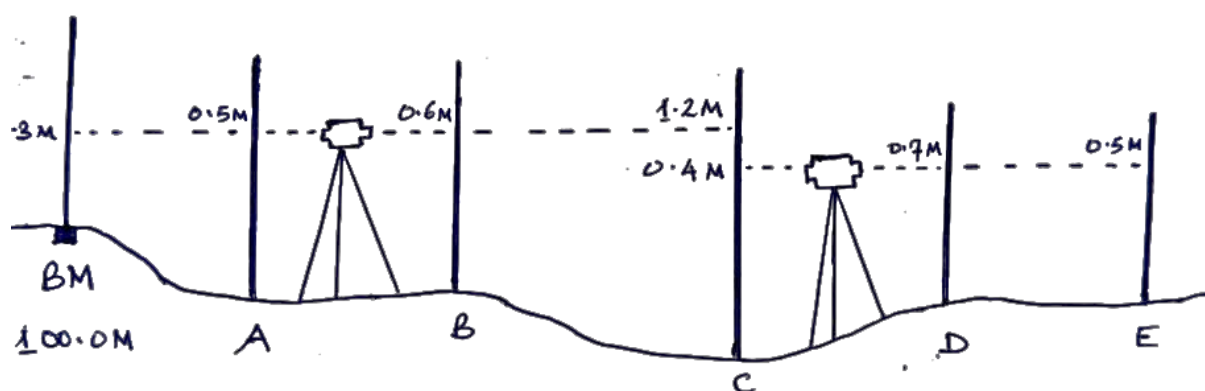
Instructions

SECTION A (40 Marks)

Answer **two (2)** questions. Question **number one (1)** is compulsory.

1. Study carefully the map extract of **Mpwapwa sheet 163/4** provided and answer the questions that follow:
 - (a) Calculate the area covered by forest in square kilometres.
 - (b) Calculate the gradient from the Bridge grid reference 140898 to Chamsimba Hill grid reference 180956.
 - (c) Describe two (02) methods that have been employed to show the exact height of relief features on a given map.
 - (d) What factors have influenced the distribution of vegetation in the area? (3 points)
 - (e) With evidence, comment on the economic activities of the area. (3 points)
 - (f) Examine the climatic conditions of the area.
 - (g) Assess the nature of transport system of the area shown on the map.
2. Carefully study the following data showing levelling survey conducted by the form six students. The observations were recorded as follow:



- (a) Record the staff reading and determine the reduced level of stations A, B, C, D and E using;
 - (i) Rise and fall method and make the simple arithmetic check.
 - (ii) Identify the change point station
- (b) What are the benefits of this method on the basis of land planning? (Give three (3) points).

6. Mr. Tola moved from Lilongwe to Dar es Salaam where he experienced different climate and human activities. In what ways does the climate influence those activities? Provide eight points.
7. Nyantunga is a student at Kiomoni Secondary School. One day she saw the natural outflow of water from the ground to the earth’s surface. Explain to her six (6) importance of that phenomenon.
